
We envision a church with a vibrant Christian spiritual life where we welcome and value all God's people... Where we grow, discover, and share our gifts in the church and in the world.

Holy Communion

Palm Sunday is the day we remember how they welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem - as a King. He humbly rode a donkey and the townspeople waved palm branches to welcome him. We also wave palms on this day to welcome him into our lives.

April 6th - Maundy Thursday

7pm at Thomas UMC [501 1st Street, Thomas]

Maundy Thursday (also known as Holy Thursday) is the day before Good Friday. It brings to our attention what happened to Jesus the night before he died, when he shared in the Passover meal with his friends and disciples.

Apríl 7th - Good Fríday

12pm (noon) at Oxford UMC

Good Friday is the day people all over the world remember the death of Jesus and the horrendous pain He experienced on our behalf. Good Friday services are held in most communities. Some churches hold noon day services to intentionally include the business community.



Apríl 9th - Easter Sunday

Easter is the culmination of Jesus defeating death and gives us hope to embrace and believe in life eternal. While people still die, Jesus, through his life and ministry made it possible to have a relationship with God now while on earth, and also to spend eternity in heaven with our Creator.

Prepare YOUR Heart and Mind for Easter

Many of you have asked "what can I do to make this season of Lent truly meaningful and to help our church continue to change and grow for the better?" Pastor Julius offers these suggestions to you to include in your journey...

- **1** Pray to be more merciful.
- **2** Attend worship regularly and invite a friend or neighbor to come with you.
- **3** Practice fasting by giving something up (related to the sacrifices of Jesus).
- **4** Give generously more resources to your church for its ministries as we grow more in the likeness of Christ and in commitment to growing a healthier stewardship foundation.
- **5** Serve and greet people at the front door with the Pastor on Sunday mornings.
- **G** Visit a person who is homebound, if health allows, or send a card of love and concern.
- **7** Take time to tell someone about your church's Lenten services and the children and youth ministries that are in development.
- **8** Make a commitment to usher for a month or more.
- **9** Make a concerted effort to sing with the Praise Team before Easter Sunday. Rehearsals are on Wednesday at 5pm.
- **1** Read daily the devotional provided by the church "Amazing Grace" by Michael Hoy. It may be found in the Sanctuary.
- 1 Contraction of the contraction
- **12** Attend and possibly help out our People Feeding People team.
- **1 3** Bring food and/or personal items for the FISH food pantry. Please note that monetary gifts are also appreciated as it allows them to purchase fresh foods for the pantry such as meat and milk.
- **1 4** Join the prayer team in remembering those who are having health issues or other concerns.
- **15** Be intentional in developing new relationships with families and their children.

May you and your loved ones feel the presence of the Holy as we prepare to go deeper into the heart of God!

<u>O How I Love Jesus</u>

Rev. Margie Crawford asks us to look at the humanity of Jesus to understand better his mission to save and transform us.(Rev. Crawford will be the new DS for our District July 2nd.)

Over the past several weeks, I have watched an advertising campaign about Jesus. It comes from an initiative called <u>He</u> <u>Gets Us</u>. The creators state the following on their website: "He Gets Us is a movement to reintroduce people to the Jesus of the Bible and his confounding love and forgiveness." The information on the website encourages visitors to examine the experiences of our Savior's life and how they still have relevance for us today.

The two stories shared in the commercials I saw remind me of how wondrously amazing Jesus' time on earth was. One informs us that he was a refugee, and the other is about those with whom he broke bread. I look forward to other ads sharing some of Jesus' life experiences.

[At the time of this writing] we are still in the season of Epiphany, which began on January 6 with the celebration of the magi visiting the child Jesus and honoring him with gifts. This story comes from Matthew 2 and is one of my favorites. I never tire of retelling the journey of the magi who traveled far from their homes to meet the King of kings. I wonder if he looked different from other children. Unfortunately, the Gospels do not describe Jesus' appearance at his birth, as a young child, or even when he spoke in the temple when he was twelve.

And yet, somehow, all who saw him and heard him recognized that he was different from anyone they had ever met. His royal status as the King of kings and Lord of lords should've had him being raised in a palace, waited on by servants, never worrying about what clothes he would wear, what foods he would eat, and how others would respect and honor him.


That was not the path he chose for our salvation. He came to walk the paths of our lives and experience the world as we do so that we understand how much our Lord and Savior loves us. The Gospels don't contain some of the human milestones we celebrate. There is no record of Jesus' first steps or what his first word might've been. Did he ever ask the four questions which were part of the Seder meal? When did he first read from the Torah, and what passage was it?

We know that Jesus' steps led him all over the nation of Israel and beyond as he brought the living word of God to all who would hear him. He asked those who would follow him, as well as those who challenged him, questions about what it meant to be a child of God. He offered words of grace, forgiveness, and love. During his life, he brought new meaning to the words of the Torah, helping to write the laws of God, not on parchment, but on our hearts.

Sometimes when we focus on the ways in which our Savior was and is fully divine, we can forget that he is also fully human. He wept at the death of his friend Lazarus and when he entered Jerusalem. He attended the wedding of family friends. He was sometimes hungry and often had no place to sleep. He needed to be alone from time to time to speak with God and renew his spirit. He sometimes became angry and frustrated by those who heard him but did not understand him. He prayed often and shared meals with friends and strangers. He saw people for who they were and did not chastise, criticize, or condemn them. Instead, he blessed them, embraced them, and forgave them.

Because he gets us. Each day he hopes that you and I will celebrate what it means to have Jesus in our lives as we continue our journeys of faith. May we continue to discover how our Lord and Savior—fully human and divine—came into the world to save us and transform us. Amen.

UMCOR In Michigan

Ready or not, disasters are a fact of life. Natural disasters include flooding, hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes, forest fires, tsunamis, and drought. War is also a disaster that disrupts life for many people throughout the world.

It is estimated that approximately 6,800 natural disasters occur each year worldwide. These disasters affect 218 million people and claim 68,000 lives at a cost of \$74.4 billion...

Disasters with devastating consequences for thousands of people even occur in Michigan. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), parts of Michigan were designated for disaster relief in 2020 and again in 2021 following severe storms, tornadoes, and massive flooding in parts of our state made worse by dam and local systems failures. Cleanup and home restoration for succinctly: many who were affected by these disasters continue.

Responding effectively to pressing human needs after disasters requires extraordinary teamwork... This [whole] article examines three key components of the United Methodist disaster response network that serves the mission of Jesus Christ here in Michigan and around the world: (1) the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR); (2) Midwest Mission, the major disaster relief distribution center for the Midwest in Pawnee, IL; and (3) the Michigan Conference Disaster Response and Recovery Team. [Today we are going to take a look at just one of these areas -]

UMCOR

United Methodists have been responding to disasters globally since 1940, when the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (MCOR) was founded to respond to Response Coordinator, UMCOR provided a vital grant in displaced and vulnerable persons in the wake of World War II. At its founding, MCOR's stated purpose was "to serve as a voice of conscience among Methodists to act in the relief of human suffering without distinction of race, color, or creed." That founding principle is still true today.

This mission arm of our denomination was renamed the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) in the 1970s and is at work today in 62 countries on five continents. UMCOR prides itself on being one of the first agencies to respond to major disasters and one of the last to leave when the work has been completed. Each year, a denominational offering received in local churches on UMCOR Sunday. this year on March 19. **2023,** covers the cost of UMCOR's small staff and disaster response trainers who travel across the country to equip volunteers for this important disaster relief work. In addition, because the annual UMCOR Sunday offering all administrative covers overhead costs for the agency, 100% of all other contributions

given to UMCOR throughout the year go directly to designated disaster relief needs.

UMCOR's website summarizes its Christian mission

UMCOR comes alongside those who suffer from natural or human-caused disasters-famine, hurricane, war, flood, fire, or other events - to alleviate suffering and serve as a source of help and hope for the vulnerable.

UMCOR provides relief, response, and long-term recovery grants when events overwhelm a community's ability to recover on its own. UMCOR also provides technical support and training for partners to address emerging and ongoing issues related to disaster relief, recovery, and long-term health and development.

In recent years, UMCOR staffing, training, and funding have been of critical help in support of locals and volunteers responding to disasters here in Michigan.

According to Dan O'Malley, Michigan Conference Disaster response to the 2017 flooding in mid-Michigan that displaced 11,000 people. The grant helped fund two disaster case managers and training for local volunteers by UMCOR consultants.

In 2020, UMCOR helped with the Central Bay District flood recovery with project grants that provided training for five disaster case managers, a supervisor, and two construction managers. It also provided \$600,000 in direct recovery assistance to Arenac and Iosco Counties.

In 2021, UMCOR's assistance in the Metro Detroit area flood recovery has helped support and train 30 disaster case managers, three resource coordinators, and three construction coordinators, and provided an \$850,000 grant for direct assistance to those in need.

Greetings from Rachel Circle

We are in the season of Lent, what does that mean? It means for a period of time (40 days, starting on Ash Wednesday & ending on Holy Thursday [2/22 to 4/6) you should be reaching deeper into your spiritual life.

Reading your Bible, look up any situation in your life right now & I guarantee the Bible has something to say on the matter. Look up several different passages & read them. Invite yourself to reread them & contemplate what is the take away message for you, and pray on it.

Praying, what is prayer ? Prayer is just a conversation that you have with our Lord Jesus Christ. He is your best friend if you let Him. However, with every relationship communication is key. He automatically knows what is in your heart, but He needs to hear from you. He needs you to want to talk to Him, one on one. Don't be a stranger. Repent - Here is a word that for many years conjured up intimidating memories from my early church days. If you share any of those same feelings after hearing that word, here are some of the other words I could relate to: remorse, sorrow, regret and here is one I was very familiar with: guilt. So, to be clear, are you sorry for behavior unworthy of a Christian ? Then let Him know you are, repent.

Our Lord does not want us to live our lives feeling guilty or sorrowful, He wants us to live joyful lives. He tells us that many times throughout the Bible. However, he does want us to review our commitments & live our lives in a






